Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) update

1 Purpose of the Report

1.1 The purpose of this paper is to provide an update LEP performance to date

2. Background

2.1 Since the formation of the LEP, it has developed its Strategic Economic Plan and has secured the following investment funds;

Local Growth Deal Round 1 £110.3m
 Local Growth Deal Round 2 £12.1m

• Growing Places £9.3m (£8.6m Capital Funds, £0.7m Revenue Funds)

RGF Business Grants
 £4m (of which £200k were operating costs)

EU Structural Investment Funds c.£95.60m (€110m)

2.2 This paper provides an update on performance across these funds. In summary all funds are fully committed and on track to deliver the agreed outputs/outcomes.

Appendix 1 provides a detailed breakdown of investment by Local Authority Area.

3. Growing Places

- 3.1 The Growing Places fund is now fully committed. This includes reinvesting the first return of £1m from Whitby Business Park.
- 3.2 We expect further returns to the fund of c£0.7m by March 2015 with £2.9m returns anticipated in 2015/16.
- 3.3 To support the development of a future pipeline of investment opportunities, we recently allocated £200k of revenue funding for partners to apply for, on a competitive basis, to support feasibility/development of capital opportunities. We received 25 bids totalling £620,000 against the allocation of £200k. The Funding has been allocated as per below.

- 3.4 Previously, the LEP has also supported development/feasibility funding for ;
 - Ripon regarding the Barracks closure,
 - Threshfield Quarry, Craven,
 - Development of the York BioHub scheme; and,
 - A market assessment for National Agri-Food Innovation Centre, Sand Hutton.

4. Regional Growth Fund – Business Grants

- 4.1 The LEP secured £4m funding, of which £3.8m was for grants with £300k for operating and due diligence costs. The programme start date was January 2014 with all funding having to be defrayed by March 2015. The target position was a cost per job of £10k (total 400 jobs) and private sector leverage of 4:1 (total £16m)
- 4.2 This fund is fully committed creating 441.5 jobs with private sector leverage of £24.64m. The provides a cost per job of £9k and private sector leverage of 6.16:1
- 4.3 The success and demand for this fund, coupled with the fact it is fully invested, is a cause for concern. LEPs/LA were excluded from bidding from the last round of Regional Growth Fund. To mitigate this, we have been working with Business Enterprise Group on a private sector led bid to provide a continuation fund. Business Enterprise Group run a successful programme in North East. We expect a decision in February.

5. Local Growth Deal

- 5.1 As you are aware the LEP secured £110.3m in the Local Growth Deal round 1. The Local Growth Deal round 2 was announced on 29 January 2015 with the LEP securing a further £12.1m.
- It should also be noted, that in addition to the LEP Local Growth Deal announcement, on the LEP East-West Connection priority, Highways Agency have allocated £100-£250m for improvements to the Hopgrove Roundabout on A64 and Leeds City Region have allocated £37m for York Outer Ring Road.

- 5.3 We have also worked closely with Leeds City region and are co-investing in; York BioHub - YNYER £5m, LCR £3m; and, Olympia Park, Selby - YNYER £8m, LCR Growing Places £3m, HCA Loan £3.5m
- 5.4 Moving forward we are looking at developing a stronger pipeline on investment priorities, with developed business cases, so we are better able to respond to investment calls. We have been working with all Local Authorities on growth plans for their key towns and this will support the work of the Directors of Development on a Spatial Plan.
- Our default position will be that investments should be repayable wherever possible. To support this position, we have been working with Homes & Communities Agency to utilise their DAT appraisal model for housing developments. All housing projects will be required to complete this model as the basis for a viability and investment appraisal.

6. EU Structural Investment Funds

- 6.1 The LEP has c.€110m EU Funds allocated to its area. Consistent with all LEPs, major concerns remain, both around the delays in government receiving approval from EU for the UK Implementation Plan and also the governance process which has been developed nationally. In particular, we are concerned around the level of local control over timings and calls.
- Whilst the national programme will not be formally signed off before June 2015, we are currently anticipating government approving some calls going out at risk in March 2015.
- 6.3 We are currently awaiting formal confirmation, however if calls go out at risk, we are hopeful that when Government receives EU sign off in June 2015, projects which have submitted applications in the March call, will be able to start spending at risk in June 2015. Priority will be given to calls whereby Local Growth Funding is dependent on the match. Agri-Tech & Biorenewables and Business Support linked to the Business Growth Hub are priority projects.
- 6.4 Disappointingly, we do not currently expect government to allow any skills projects to submit calls in the March round. This is as a result of on-going negotiations with EU around priority groups.
