#### Councillor Carl Les – North Yorkshire Council

County Councillor Carl Les is Leader of North Yorkshire Council and represents the Catterick Village and Brompton on Swale division. His background is in hospitality and hotel management.

He is Chairman of the North Yorkshire Police and Crime Panel and sits on various boards representing the Council, especially the Local Enterprise Partnership.

Pantry. Carl is active in the voluntary sector as a school governor, trustee of North Yorkshire Youth and Mid North Yorkshire CAB, and a director of the Wensleydale Railway.



#### Sarah Longlands, CLES (Centre for local economic strategies)

Sarah is the Chief Executive of CLES, the Centre for Local Economic Strategies which is a charity and think tank which works towards national economic change through local delivery. Sarah is an advocate for investment in local public services and the creation of places which enable people to live good lives. Before joining CLES in 2021, Sarah was Director of IPPR North, the dedicated think tank for the North of England. She began her career in local government, which included a many happy days working in economic development for North Yorkshire County Council. She has a PhD in Urban Studies from the University of Glasgow.



#### **Neil Denton, The Relationship Project / Durham University**



Neil believes there is an energy within disagreement and conflict that can be a powerful force for positive change. He helps communities in conflict to find ways to reduce violence, increase justice, solve real life problems and strengthen human relationships. He is an Independent Community Mediator, an Associate with the Relationships Project, co- founder of the After Disasters Network and a Professor in Practice at the Institute of Hazard, Risk and Resilience, Durham University. He works to find ways that place communities at the heart of our thinking and doing, and to explore and demonstrate how the principles and practices of conflict transformation can be beneficial to disaster prevention, response and recovery. He also spends time swimming and attempting to create the perfect roast potato.

#### Workshop 4 - Working together to respond to anti-migrant activity in North Yorkshire

Room: Crimple

**Facilitators:** Dr Gareth Harris, an independent researcher/facilitator based in the UK, affiliated to the Centre for Trust, Peace and Social Relations at Coventry University supported by Lesley Gray, North Yorkshire Council, Sgt Ben Hallewell, North Yorkshire Police

As public concern over asylum has grown in political salience, anti-minority groups have increasingly sought to exploit concerns over asylum accommodation to further their own agendas. The activity of such groups can have a polarising effect on cohesion, community relations, and local democracy. The session will provide an overview of organised anti-migrant activity in the UK, explore how this plays out locally across North Yorkshire, and look at ways that practitioners can respond to concerns over asylum without amplifying the narratives of extremist actors. We will focus on how these groups are exploiting local asylum accommodation schemes that exist within local authorities. Throughout the workshop we will be raising the awareness of such groups and how communities and partners can work together to help build resilience against such activity.

The North Yorkshire Council community awards will be awarded at the conference. This year there were a total of 147 nominations for 123 different groups and individuals.

The finalists are:

#### **Best community group**

**Neurodiverse Community Catterick** - Run by a team of Neurodivergent volunteers and parent carers. They support military and civilian families within and around Catterick Garrison and engaging further afield in North Yorkshire. They focus on mental health, inclusion, equality, advocacy, training, employment support for young adults, support with paperwork and creating inclusive groups to meet others who are alike. They support with preparing for adult hood; understanding the transition that will come.

**Reeth And District Community Transport** -Offer shopping days and day trips out to places of interest. However, they realised that transport wasn't the only thing that their elderly community needed. They now also deliver prescriptions weekly, organise get togethers to promote good mental health and set up an Open Minds group, which is like a youth club for the elderly. They have organised a healthy eat class, a gentle walking group, picnics at the vicarage and an afternoon tea group.

**Skipton Step Into Action** Set up in response to the Covid-19 Pandemic, run by, and for, local people. They have a large volunteer base and grassroots community reach, providing inclusive community services and activities. They offer one to one befriending support, run a number of wellbeing projects to support group based activities, including Nurturing Growth offering gentle nature based mindful group activities and exercise for wellbeing; Step Into Action Wellbeing Hub & Cafe out of hours provision offering snacks/light meals, art activities, games, health checks, guest speakers/demos along with support & signposting. In April 2023 they launched a volunteer transport & wheelchair accessible transport service for the Skipton & South Craven communities, responding to the closure of the previous service in the area.

### Volunteer of the year

**Kendra Davies** - Kendra volunteers at Gallows Close Centre which has many different events and activities on. She has provided, pie and peas and an afternoon tea for a community bingo afternoon, helped organise, decorate and be in the kitchen for community summer fairs and halloween parties, and cooks and hands out hundreds of free lunches to children on low incomes in the holidays. She joins in with the knit and natter group, youth clubs and has also become a member of the Barrowcliff big local to help have more input in community ideas and is always on hand simply if anybody pops in for a chat which was especially helpful during the winter when she was part of the community centres warm hub and ready with a hot drink.

**Colin Etherington** - After 23 years of volunteering in many sectors for Age UK North Craven, Colin now volunteers weekly at our Coffee & Chat group. He entertains with quizzes, games, poetry and life stories. He is also a volunteer for Dementia Forward.

**Anne Galloway** Anne is one of the voluntary trustees of Settle Swimming Pool. She has main responsibility and oversight of the staffing and management aspects of the pool. This has been particularly important during the reopening of the pool in October 2022 and the almost complete change of paid staff. She also takes a key responsibility for the running of the charity shop which runs entirely on volunteer input. Anne organises the rota, runs the shop sub-committee with fellow trustees and maintains an overview of the stock and its organisation.

#### **Caring for the environment**

**Circular Malton and Norton -** Circular Malton and Norton has set out a vision to become Yorkshire's first circular market town. Their first town initiative - to collect the local inedible commercial food & bio waste and transfer it to a community anaerobic digester has secured wide spread support from local residents, businesses and councillors and is now at final planning permission stage. Their second initiative was developed specifically to enable every resident to be able to engage with ways to make a difference to climate change. Ryedale Remakes is a town centre upcycling shop & workshop that provides a highly visible and participative way in which people can divert waste from landfill to keeping items in circulation and become inspired to do more. This sees volunteers repurposing donated household items, while encouraging and upskilling others to refurbish and upcycle for themselves. So far having saved over 400 items, their unique gifts are bought from the shop and the funds reinvested in running upcycling skills workshops from crocheting to woodwork and more.

**Richmond School Eco Club** - Richmond School Eco Club is a student-voice led group, who meet weekly to work on improving 3 main targets in the school grounds: Reducing energy usage 2. Improving Biodiversity 3. Reducing waste. The pupils have taken part in many different activities across the year in order to achieve their targets and this culminated in achieving 'Green Flag' status. These activities range from litter picking to volunteering days at Foxglove Covert Nature Reserve, to planting wildflowers and making bird feeders out of plastic bottles. The main event this year was planting over 400 trees on the school site that were donated by the Woodland Trust

**Sustainable Swaledale** - Sustainable Swaledale is a small four-year old volunteer-only organisation, caring for the environment by coordinating projects that connect people with nature via practical enhancement and sustainability projects. There are currently four projects: a tree-planting project that

has expanded to include a tree nursery and woodland monitoring; a swift, swallows and martins project erecting bird boxes and collecting population data, and a meadow and wildflower restoration project. The projects overlap to provide a coherent whole for biodiversity and community engagement. A fourth project addresses local food growing and sharing.

The judges also decided to award a 'Highly Commended' certificate to the following nominees

**Resurrected Bites-** Aim to reduce food waste and food poverty. They work with local businesses and suppliers to divert good quality food from landfill. Instead, they convert it into meals in their pay-as-you-feel cafes and provide it to families through their community groceries scheme. The members of the community grocery are also offered support via their Work Club, budgeting courses, signposting and cookery courses.

**Tadcrafters -** Tadcrafters aims to engage people to get involved within the local community by carrying-out activities which support a range of charities and worthy causes as well as promote biodiversity and reduce waste. They run crafting and woodworking groups, a beekeeping group and a gardening group in Tadcaster, as well as a Sherburn crafting group. They also support local Afghan and Ukrainian refugees and take an active part in lots of other community activities. They create kits and projects for volunteers to sew and knit and liaise with individuals and local interior design companies to collect their surplus fabric which they re-purpose.

**Lynn Smith** - Lynn volunteers for a number of charities/ services within including Skipton Foodbank (now the Trussell Trust) sorting and distributing food parcels and working with the local Morrisons to support with their food donations; Skipton Step Into Action, Volunteer transport; befriending duties including shopping/errand running; visiting the lonely and isolated and friendly phone calls to those who don't want visits; she supports regularly at the Step Into Action Wellbeing projects and on joint ventures with Rotary Club Skipton Craven and Rotary Club Skipton raising funds for local needs. She also volunteers for Dementia Forward in the local area.

**Jean Walling** - Jean has volunteered with Richmondshire Early Help in various groups, from Breastfeeding support groups to Youth clubs for over 10 years. Prior to covid, Jean was supporting several groups a week. In her current role Jean volunteers at Youthability, a youth group for young people with special educational needs and disabilities.

**Kirkbymoorside Environment Group** *The group started in 2006 and since then the group has undertaken a wide range of activities to help the environment including:* 

- Supporting the Moorsbus public transport network, which enables greener travel choices for tourists and local people to and around the North York Moors.
- publishing local town guide to show where items can be locally bought, assisting local businesses to thrive and reduces travel outside the area.
- managing their tree nursery and husbandry of local trees and hedges in conjunction with Kirkbymoorside Town Council. Other related activities include coppicing, haymaking and the laying of new hedges.

- Repair cafes where the public is invited to bring along faulty items for repair free of charge and Give or Take Days.

PALS with Trowels - PALS with Trowels was established with the aim of enhancing the opens spaces in Burton in Lonsdale for the enjoyment of all. This work has grown from bulb planting to developing and maintaining an orchard, picnic site and wildlife area on what was formerly scrubland adjacent to the River Greta. To assist with funding the group hold regular plant sales at the village hall, selling plants grown by group members and donated by villagers. In 2022 the Pals started a 'book café' in the village hall. Held bimonthly on a Saturday morning in the village hall this café, selling bacon buns and cakes gives village residents the opportunity to meet and to exchange books free of charge using surplus funds to support PALS projects. The group also organises the village open garden scheme which takes place every two years.

**Brimhams Active** is a Community Health and Wellbeing company. We will provide information about our Health and wellbeing Hubs, Leisure and wellness Centres, Little Explorers nursery and our Active Health programme which offers activities and programmes for Long term health conditions, social connection and food share opportunities.

Carers' Resource exists to support unpaid carers. We provide information, advice and support to carers, to the people they care for and to professionals who work with them. Our service ranges from emotional support to benefit application advice and also signposting to specialist organisations. We provide support in a variety of caring related areas including adult carers, young carers, a free sitting service to give carers time off and hospital to home transition support. We also have many groups for carers specific to the person they care for, such as parent carers, dementia, mental health and male carers.











Cloverleaf Advocacy is an independent charity, and all our services are free and confidential for those who need us. We can help people to find information, understand and uphold their rights, consider their options, get the support they need, speak up about the issues that matter to them.

**Community First Yorkshire** We are the rural community council for North Yorkshire, providing advocacy for rural communities and parish councils. We also provide practical support to voluntary and community organisations, and social enterprises in North Yorkshire primarily through 1:1 support but also through our networks, projects, training and other services. Information will include leaflets on our Community Support North Yorkshire service; online volunteer directory - looking for volunteers and wanting to volunteer; Community Led Housing, Older People's Network, Employment Advice Service etc.

#### **Community Led Homes North Yorkshire and East**

**Community Works.** We will promote our wide range of support services that cover Thirsk and Richmond. These include employability support, welfare and wellbeing groups, dementia day-care services and car scheme.

**CPRE North and East Yorkshire,** as a volunteer-led charity, focuses on the promotion, protection, and enhancement of North and East Yorkshire. **New Beginnings Peer Support** is a peer-led after-crisis domestic abuse service for women and their children who have previously been subjected to domestic abuse. We offer long-term tailored support including 1:1 and group peer support sessions, emotional resilience tools, donations of food, clothes, toys and household items, goal finding and setting, education and training support, signposting and supported introductions to other services, family activities, family wellbeing packs and a client to volunteer pathway. **Nidderdale Plus Community Hub** provides a wealth of local services to residents of Nidderdale and the Washburn Valley. We would have information on our stand about our various services including minibus days out and group hire, digital champion service, befriending service, meals on wheels, charity shop, community transport service and more.

The North York Moors Trust is a small independent registered charity. We work with people and communities within the National Park and surrounding areas to provide equal opportunity to access and connect with nature and enjoy the associated health and wellbeing benefits. Through those connections the Trust promotes the importance of conserving the natural environment and supporting resilience building by empowering people to participate in projects that protect, restore, and enhance the North York Moors and the wildlife it supports.

North Yorkshire Citizens Advice & Law Centre: We deliver services across all of North Yorkshire providing the advice people need for the problems they face, whoever they are and whatever the problem. Our specialist advice services cover debt, benefits, fuel poverty and energy, housing, discrimination and family issues. The people we support are five times more likely to be on low incomes and 55% have a disability or long term health condition. Many are in crisis by the time they reach out to us, unable to see a way out of the situation they find themselves in, for example facing eviction or unable to afford to top up their meters. We help them find a solution to their immediate issues and develop the skills to address similar situations if they arise again through specialist one to one advice and support provided by experienced and qualified advisers and highly skilled volunteers. Last year, we helped











21,568 people address 104,779 issues, leading to £17,316,772 in income gain and £2,483,613 of debt written off. As a result, 85% of people said that as a result of our advice they could now see a way forward and 86% would recommend us to family and friends. In 2022/23 for every £1 invested in our organisation we added £31.30 in public value (e.g. improved participation and productivity) and £10.63 in value for the people we help (e.g. income gained, debts written off or consumer problems resolved.

#### **North Yorkshire Council - Adult Learning Service**

As key providers of community based education and with an emphasis on engagement, the adult leaning services (and our work as co-ordinators of Multiply) is keen to use its funding to empower communities and individuals to upskill / reskill and overcome barriers
